I am Lord Gwydion Glyndwr, I have recently become the Minister of Arts & Sciences for the Barony of Shadowed Stars. I have been in the SCA for a little over three years or so. I am apprenticed to Mistress Serena Kimbalwyke. I have been a beekeeper for 6 years, leather crafter for 5, falconer for 5, and blacksmith for 3. I've taught around 7 classes on different subject including a blacksmithing class I recently taught at Mounted War Games.

With winter coming the Barony's fighter practices will be moving into some kind of an indoor space. In the past year or so that location has been different than where we have held our A&S classes. I would like for that to change and have everything in one location. My goal is to have at least two classes scheduled a month. If you've taken a class at an event or somewhere recently, consider bringing what you've learned back to the Barony and teach all of us. There are so many things out there to learn. Don't put limits on your knowledge.

Dyeing At Mounted War Games

You may have heard that people were dyeing at MWG. It's true. I held a two day workshop with a few different dyes, alum for mordant, tannin for plant fibers, and iron for modifier. The dyes we used were indigo, annatto seed, and cochineal. These would have only been used very late period, beginning around 1518, as they were not common to Europe. The indigo used was pre-reduced crystals, as I wanted to be sure we had a vat that would be ready to use. In period, it would have needed fermenting for a long period of time. The indigo was the most exciting. Everyone who watched a batch come out of the dye pot was fascinated by the swift change in color from green to blue upon exposure to oxygen.



The annatto seed came already powdered. This was placed in a small muslin bag and boiled with hot water to release the dye. It was initially quite disappointing, as items left in the pot nearly all day still came out a fairly pale orange. The following day, after some Google, I added washing soda to the dye pot and this spurred the release of huge quantities of additional dye from the dye pouch. I got some fairly bright orange the second day.



The cochineal came as dried bugs. I ground it up with mortar and pestle, then put it into another muslin bag for boiling. We got a bright red-purple from this. The second day for the cochineal, I added cream of tartar hoping for more red and less purple. The dye bath definitely shifted, however, the cotton did not seem to really want to soak up the dye as much once I added the cream of tartar. The wool and silk did much better. The wool came out kind of pink to mauve. All fabrics used in the cochineal and annatto were mordanted with alum. Most of the cellulose fiber was also pre soaked in a tannin solution. Several items were dipped in an after bath of the iron solution for 10-15 seconds. One surprise was a cotton tunic that went in the cochineal with the cream of tartar. It got the 10 second iron treatment and came out pretty much grey, about the color of elephant skin. Most people were happy to just watch, and keep their hands dye free.



I did have a couple of helpers. Lily, who brought a cotton dress to dye, was eager to help with each step of the process, from pre-soaking the fabric, squeezing out the excess water, soaking in the mordant bath, and finally putting it in the dye pot. She was very excited to pull the dress out of the dye pot to see the bright purple results. Greta came to help me with my last batch to go in the indigo pot. After pulling the fabric from the pot and wringing out the excess, she waved the fabric until it was completely oxidized.

Kathleen Haak won the Cart Maneuvering Challenge Course (3) and was named the MVP of the Daiku Game (Japanese Polocrosse) (9).




Sofia Crivelli won the Spear Throw saddle division (12) and Baron Ulrich Halfdon Ulfsson won the cart division.

Would they even want an old timer like me? I had invested 30 years of my life to the SCA and been gone for 5 years. Five years seemed like an eternity.
