It is your humble and honored seneschal Rashid here with an update to COVIDSafe guidelines that we are following in the Midrealm. As of March 7th the requirement to gather contact tracing information and/or preregister for an event was lifted.



There will still be the expectation to post the COVID disclaimer on all event websites and prominently on site, and we are still required to check for either proof of vaccination or proof of a negative COVID test result at every event, including meetings and practices. This will occur at gate for events and at the beginning of each practice or meeting held by the group.

The COVIDSafe attestation document must be submitted to the waiver deputy within 30 days of the event/meeting/practice that was held. Likewise, each person at said interaction must have their proof checked by someone and they must sign the COVIDSafe attestation form, similar in nature to our other waiver forms. Hopefully with this change it is a sign that our game will get back to normal, whatever normal is for a SCAdian. In all seriousness, if you have any questions please reach out to me and thank you for your time.


Like many of you, I spent much of the past cou-



Examples: Beekeeping, Sewing, Coining, Cooking, Historical Martial Arts, Blacksmithing, Weaving, Brewing, Jewelry Making, Woodworking, Painting, Calligraphy, Jllumination, Papermaking, Embroidery, Shoemaking, Tent design and creation, Research, Music, Perfumery, Hair braiding, Fabric Stamping, Sword-Smithing, Book Binding, Falconry, and ETC. 

Guess What?!? You're on vigil!! (The joys and challenges of planning a surprise vigil)

I had been in the SCA for about 30 years when I was put on vigil for the Order of the Pelican, the Society's high level service award. It was at Kingdom A&S/Spring Crown Tournament and, that year, Shadowed Stars was hosting. It was Saturday evening and I was the last of six people put on vigil for the Order. It's a

bit of a blur, but at least I had lots of time to plan—That was on May 27th and I was to be elevated at court at Mounted War Games in early September.

On March 26 of this year, at Better War Thru Archery, I was part of a big secret! My good friend, Baron Gareth, and I were allowed to ask the King and Queen of the Midrealm to place our protégé, Zahra Tesfaye, on vigil. How exciting!

To most folks watching, that's where the story started. But for Gareth and me, along with our spouses, it had been seven weeks of frantic planning to make sure this day was what Zahra would want. Their Majesties, Ullr and Annelyse, did not want to do what I had done: put her on vigil at one event and elevate her at another. Book Recommendation




Nobody Likes a Goblin by Ben Hatke

Published by First Second, 2016

Target age 4-8 years with adult directed text

Imagine an adventure story from the point of view of the "bad guys." Goblin lives in



his home, which is a cozy, rat-infested dungeon, with his only friend Skeleton. They play with the treasure in the dungeon and live contented lives until one day an adventuring party of "heroes" comes in and shatter their peace. The party takes off with the treasure and his best friend Skeleton, so Goblin must venture out into the world where he discovers how those outside of his dungeon feel about goblins.

While this is not a book about the Middle Ages, it will certainly be of interest to those who like medieval and fantasy stories and will delight both children and adults. The illustrations are wonderful and at times adorable. They were created with India ink, Sakura Micron pens, watercolors, and assorted brushes. The themes of friendship, overcoming adversity and bravery will resonate at any age.

Favorite parts:

Gianna (age 7) likes the scene where the goblins and their friends chase away the adventurers once and for all.

Francesca (age 5) loves the scene where Goblin is chased out of the inn because there is a cat.

Midrealm swept the equestrian war points at Gulf Wars. Draco Invictus!

Gulf Wars 30 has been and will be a fond memory for me. I took a solo trip with my two equines across the country and shared them across kingdoms and with Their Majesties. Sharing food, hugs, and conversation filled my heart with joy. And jousting- my favorite thing!

The weather varied from mild to very cold, sunny to rainy, but overall, pleasant. I participated in mounted activities like Ride Before a Prince, jousting, archery, a challenge course, page's tourney, daiku, pony rides for non-equestrians, site riding among the camping populace and royal procession. I served as a mounted marshal for mounted combat, hosted buzkashi and a challenge course. And in my "spare time," I spent the evenings in the dance hall.

Baroness Halldora Egilsdotter, Lady Geneva de Saint Martin, and I all represented the Barony as we visited the kingdom of Glen Abhainn. My new horse, Zephyr is young- 4 1/2 years old. Her experience is limited and her skeleton is still growing, so she can't yet be expected to do all the things. My original horse, Kira is an old pro at 14 years old, but retired from the jousting list due to physical and neurological restrictions. Both of them behaved and performed phenomenally all week. With Zephyr, I was proud to win the mounted archery competition and the challenge course of various skills at arms, which was a war point. I was very pleased to earn second in the Ride Before a Prince competition. Here, you study the historical manuscripts of classical equine training and perform a routine of your own choreography to exemplify your mount's abilities. Additionally, Zephyr carried His Royal Majesty Ullr, while Her Majesty AnneLyse rode Kira; a great honor to be sure.

I spent time training Zephyr for jousting at Gulf Wars but didn't want to overface her by entering her first tournament before she was ready. Lancer Arabella of the Outlands offered me a chance to ride her horse, Coda in his first joust tournament. While I immensely enjoyed my time holding a lance, we did not win, but I was so proud to watch my fellow equestrian, Mistress Lora Greymare take the victory during her horse's first tournament; another Midrealm war point earned. Kira carried a number of children during pony rides and performed alongside them as kids raced on stick horses in the page's tourney. We strolled around campsites, stopping for pets from young and old. Lady Rosamund helped to take care of Kira and they placed in some competitions as well.

Daiku is a historical game from Japan, played like polocrosse with net-topped sticks, lobbing balls into a goal as a team. Everyone on the field shared in great sport and laughter. I hosted another team game called Buzkashi, a game from the east, where a facimile plush goat is passed like a football into the scoring zone before the other team. The rain cancelled a mounted combat game that I would have hosted as the third war point. I did host a challenge course that scored superior horsemanship alongside skills with weapons, which Lora Greymare won and Geneva helped me to score.

Their Majesties hosted a kingdom court, where they presented awards to worthy Midrealmers and paid all of Their subjects with "war pay" of stamped coins for the fighting, participation, and volunteering that was done at war.

I wish that I had time for other war activities like Rossfechten- a mounted swordsmanship class and competition, cart driving, and combat archery.

Around 35 horses attended the war this year; that's about 20 fewer than normal. Spirits were high and the comeradery was strong. Many meals and stories were shared around the campfire. It was hard to leave such a friendly community of people. I am grateful for my friends, Sofia Crivelli and Wolfgang von Metten of South Oaken for permitting me and my horses to overnight with them on my long journey. Travel issues included changing a spark plug and rewiring the trailer lights that broke en route home. Otherwise, it was a smooth journey and I can't wait to return.

Let the warm weather commence and the training intensify!

Communication is of vital importance on the battlefield. Battlefield communication needs to be clear and concise in order to be effective and efficient, especially in regards to communicating battlefield commands and orders.

Battlefield Commands Commanders utilize a variety of terms to communicate battlefield orders to their troops; a well-disciplined army maintains its effectiveness and efficiency through common language on the field. Battlefield orders should follow a 'command-execute' formula, such as "Prepare to charge: Charge!" The formula works by the commander priming his troops with a command ("Prepare to charge."), every troop in the unit receiving the order echoing the command, and the execution order ("Charge!"). By priming the troops with a 'prepare' order, every troop is given the opportunity to become aware of the order and process it; this is reinforced by their repetition of the command. Once the execution order is given troops are able to execute it without hesitation.

Maneuvering

The goal of basic tactical movement on the battlefield is to move a unit from point A to point B while maintaining unit cohesiveness, or battle order and formation for the purpose of creating positional advantage.

Advancing


Units advance forward at a pace ordered by the commander, typically at a walk, fastwalk, or charge. Advances may be called on the step, such as when the commander orders the unit to advance five steps. When advancing, the unit moves as a single entity, with the rear ranks keeping pace with the front rank.

Falling Back

Retreating has little need or value in SCA combat, but there are times when it is tactically advantageous to fall back (for example: the unit has advanced beyond the target of its Mission Intent, or terrain is tactically superior behind the unit's present location, or to regroup). When falling back the rear ranks control the pace of movement and it is crucial that line commanders communicate from rear to front in order to keep the unit ordered during the movement; a pile-up of the ranks caused by the front moving too quickly into the rear can create a lethal situation against an assault.

Slide


When sliding, the unit moves as a whole to the left or right while maintaining its current facing.



Wheel

Wheeling is the act of turning a unit ninety degrees. It


performed by the unit moving around one of its front corners; if wheeling right the unit will move around its front right corner and if wheeling left it will move around its front left corner. That corner becomes the axis around which the unit pivots. The opposite corner of the front rank begins the motion of the pivot, with the rear ranks following.



Battle order is the tactical formation of a deployed combat unit. Battle orders include the column, the oblique/echelon, and the flying wedge and inverted wedge. Tactical order also refers to the physical arrangement of troops within a unit, such as in loose order, open order, or closed order.


Loose Order

Loose ordered troops are generally deployed across a larger front, with greater spaces between individuals. Loose order allows for a greater fluidity of movement in the unit but looses the efficiency of easy communication down the line. Localized lance commanders must become more aware of the overall situation and prepared to react and lead as the situation unfolds.



Open Order


Troops deployed in an open order are generally arranged evenly spaced but fairly close to one another. This order gives spears and pole arms room to work in a shield wall while keeping them reasonably protected.



Closed Order

When deployed in closed order, troops are arranged in a tight formation designed to prevent penetration by enemy units. Shields generally form the front ranks and flanks of the unit, with spears and poles protected in the center, but limited in their effectiveness.
